After a group photo at Goliath it was time to hit the other rides in the park along with seeing the progress made in renewing the Lickskillet area that had gone underwater during the Fall's flooding.

Lunch was superb as always. Salads, pastas and pies were enjoyed with some sweet Georgia tea. The photo walk back lottery was expanded, and I hope I surprised some trustworthy ACE volunteers and Assistant Reps by giving out thank you plaques to everyone who had helped me religiously over the last dozen years. Finally, I got to introduce my successor, Josh Herrington. I know Josh will bring an enthusiasm to the job and hope everyone chips in to help. At that point I felt my time was over. I enjoyed the walk back tour (I guess now I'll have to buy tickets next year) and got to mingle with some great people from all over the Region and beyond. It was nice to be able to sit down and not feel "responsible."

Thanks to the weather, Park President Melinda Ashcraft, PR Manager Kendell Kelton, all the other SFOG staff, and the assistants, especially Kim Fowler (who really did all the Spring Fling planning this year so "I wouldn't know") and Andi Westland (who put together the photo montage), and everyone else who said something, came to an event over the last dozen years, or was just a member during that time. It was a great dozen years and let's keep the Southeast going for many more!

The park is celebrating its 25th year as Dollywood and Miss Parton has been there to share in the fun.

Dolly was on hand for opening day to christen the new for 2010 Adventure Mountain. The fun began as Challenger, the famous bald eagle, took flight over the structure. Everyone then moved in to get harnessed up for the huge challenge course that features four separate experiences. Geyser Gorge lets you cross over a geyser. Black Bear Cliff features a hands free walk around a sheer rock face. Make it up to the top of Rocky Top Trail and you can ring the bell to proclaim you have made it to the mountain's summit. The kiddies can stay at the bottom and have fun at Camp Teachittoomee.

May was even busier as three events converged at the same time. Dolly was in town with Miley Cyrus and Kenny Rogers to film a Hallmark Channel special for the 25th anniversary. She was also there to help draw people to her "Dolly Helps Nashville" benefit for the flood victims of the Cumberland River. Of course, May means that it is time for Thrills in the Hills, the park's very own enthusiast event. Now in its third year, it features ERT, great food and lots of surprises. Upon check in, everyone received a Thrills in the Hills t-shirt, pin and patch all stuffed into a Dollywood string backpack.

Friday evening kicked off with a reception featuring homemade cake and fresh kettle korn. After the park cleared out, attendees were treated to ERT on Mystery Mine and the mighty Thunderhead.

Saturday morning began with a muffin, fruit and juice breakfast served in a Dollywood 25th anniversary lunchbox. We then moved on to a lights on tour of Blazing Fury. A trip through the maintenance bay revealed that the beloved dark ride has been treated to a complete rebuild of all of the ride vehicles so that they will run for years to come.

Lunch was served in the Whistle Stop Cafe and featured a pasta bar with fresh veggies, spinach salad with raspberry vinaigrette and cheesecake for desert. Entertainment was provided by the silky smooth voices of the Silvertones singing oldies favorites. They were later joined by the force of nature known as Miss Lillian, who made sure all were filled with the chicken spirit. Following the meal, an auction for the National Roller Coaster museum featured items signed by Dolly as well as various coaster parts. The big ticket item was a sculpture fashioned from a wheel and brake pad from Mystery Mine topped with a crow and filled with a shot glass.

As lunch ended, everyone was quickly directed to DP's Celebrity Theater for front row seating to "Sha-Kon-O-Hey!" that was followed by a surprise visit from Dolly. She sang the song "My Mountains, My Home" which is one of the eight songs she wrote for the musical inspired by the Great Smoky Mountains National Park's 75th Anniversary. The next item on the agenda was the regular show by the Silvertones. Dolly's schedule was a well kept secret, but Media/Public Relations Manager Pete Owens and the lovely and talented Ashley Adams made sure that we got there early so we could see Dolly drive by on her touring car.

As the day ended, everyone gathered in Hall of Memories for pictures in ride vehicles from the departed Flooded Mine dark ride and Thunder Express mine train. The evening ended with ERT on Tennessee Tornado and Blazing Fury. But the fun didn't end there as emails arrived later in the week with the group picture and a mp3 of the beloved Molly from Blazing Fury proclaiming that she's going to jump - so you'd better be ready to catch her!

Dollywood was ending their Festival of Nations and we had not been to Virginia in about 3 years, so we packed our bags and headed out.

Since we went to Dollywood on a weekday, the crowds weren't bad and the shows were fantastic. Friday, we left Pigeon Forge for Virginia, taking our time and stopping at Dixie Caverns in Salem, VA. Arriving in the Richmond area on Friday during traffic time, we decided to stop for dinner in Ashland and eat at the

Iron Horse Restaurant. Fabulous food!

The one drawback to our weekend plans was the weather. Everything was pointing toward a soggy minication, spoiling my husband's birthday. Despite the forecast, we decided to make the best of the

situation and enjoy ourselves. Saturday we had plans for Kings Dominion all day, hoping to get a ride on the new Intimidator 305. Even with a cheerleading competition at the park, crowds were very low, since everyone was expecting rain.

We used the passholder privilege of an early walk-back to I-305 for the first ride of the day. Wow! What a ride! We ran back around to get another ride and were shocked how much it takes out of you, leaving you disoriented from the near

blackout G-forces. As the day continued, we were spared any of the rain the forecasters had predicted, just menacing skies overhead and lots of wind. We prayed our luck would hold out for Sunday, my husband's birthday at Busch Gardens Wil-

laimsburg, since I had a special surprise lined up for him.

Earlier in the week I had booked the VIP behind the scenes coaster tour at Busch Gardens, having read some good reviews by those that had experienced it. The tour begins 2 hours before the park

opens, and attendees are escorted to the closest parking by security, where we meet up with our 2 tour guides. Our group con-

> sisted of only two other paying customers besides my husband and myself. We began the tour at Loch Ness Monster, walking down the steps to the river to get a good look at Nessie's interlocking loops. Back up the stairs, we head into the belly of the beast, the maintenance

area under the loading station. They show us the "secret" doors under Nessie where they check under the train and let us hold the extra wheels that are kept in large supply.

Our next stop was the main reason I had wanted to take the tour: a ride to the top of Griffon in the evac car! We stop at the top, 200 feet above the park and walk all the way to the drop-off, where they have a train parked for us to admire and take pictures. After more pictures, we ride back

> down to Earth and get a tour of the maintenance area. A third train is parked overhead and we are allowed an up close look underneath the massive vehicle. Then we head into Griffon's loading station for 2 private rides, sitting wherever we wish.

Our next stop is Alpengeist, with two more exclusive rides and then a tour of the maintenance area. Once again, a third train is parked inside, where we get up close and personal. A passing security guard gives us a look at the personal cell phones that were collected by the inspection crew that morning. There wasn't very much left of any in the pile! Continuing our loop around the park, we head for



Italy for our exclusive rides on Apollo's Chariot. Still one of my all time favorites.

By now we are back to our starting point at the front of the park, ready for our final exclusive rides (or so we thought)

on Loch Ness Monster. Our guides know enthusiasts will ride anything, so they escort us to the Sesame Street section of the park for our last exclusive ride: Grover's Alpine Express coaster. Time has sped by and before you know it, nearly four hours have passed and our tour has come to an end! We are handed a card for 1 ride on each of the four main coasters, allowing us to skip the lines (what lines?!) later in the day and told we can pick up a CD of pictures our guides took of us during the tour. Once again, the weather held off, keeping the crowds light, and not spoiling our perfect day. I could not stop smiling the entire time during our tour. If you truly call yourself a coaster lover, I highly recommend booking this tour the next time you are visiting Busch Gardens Europe. You won't stop smiling either.
